

DEAR FAMILIES AND FRIENDS:

As always, the health and well-being of our residents / your loved ones is our primary concern, as we are continuing to follow the guidelines and recommendations of the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS), **Ohio Dept. of Health (ODH)** and the Portage County Health Department. Even though the state of Ohio is beginning a phased “opening” in May, the “no visitation” directive will not be lifted in the near term. We are aware of how difficult this continues to be for our families, **and we will continue to assist with FaceTime so at least virtual visitation is possible.** Please contact our activities department to set up an appointment to Skype / Face Time with your loved one. **We have had some families doing “window visits,” where they are talking to their loved one through the resident’s window. We understand the importance of seeing your loved one in person—we just ask that you keep the window or exterior door closed for everyone’s protection. Also, we have many resident rooms/apartments that are in locations not safe to walk to around the building. Please contact the front desk so we can arrange a location that is safe for you and your loved one.**

Please check the Anna Maria Facebook page, as well as our website, for general updates, pictures, and campus news. **Along those lines, we have been sending out emails to update families on any overall COVID status changes. If you are the primary contact for your loved one, and you have not received an email, please send an email to jporemba@annamariaofaurora.com,** so that we can update your contact information. Of course, we would be contacting the responsible party directly with any changes of condition with an individual resident.

We appreciate your patience and cooperation during this chaotic and uncertain time. If you have any questions, please contact administrators Aaron Baker or Chris Norton, who will be happy to discuss any concerns you may have. Let’s continue to work together during this difficult time. Thank you.

RESIDENT PROFILE

VIRGINIA “GINGER” OTCASEK

Just tell them “Ginger sent you!”

Ginger was the second youngest of four girls, born and raised in the very rural town of Hillside, PA (about 22 miles southwest of Scranton). The family struggled to make ends meet, as their father, a steelworker, did not always maintain steady employment. Dad, mom, and the four girls lived in a small house with only four rooms: two bedrooms, a living room, and a kitchen. If it appears that a room is missing, you are correct. The house lacked indoor plumbing, and the family used an outhouse.

While in high school, Ginger worked for Pennsylvania Bell, a job she really enjoyed. Ginger traveled to Cleveland to visit relatives where she was introduced to a family friend, Charles Otcasek. The two became friends and often corresponded by mail. In 1954, following graduation from Derry Township High School, Ginger and her family moved to East Cleveland, purchasing a house with – indoor plumbing! Once settled, Ginger and Charles could finally begin a real courtship. About one year later, the two married. Luckily, Ginger was able to obtain a transfer from Pennsylvania Bell to Ohio Bell, where she worked until baby #1 was born.

While Charles was busy working at the General Motors Fisher Body Plant, Ginger was busy at home raising her children. Ginger and Charles were blessed with six children in 10 years – two boys and four girls. Ginger enjoyed her time at home with her children for 28 years before suffering a brain aneurysm. She was hospitalized for 69 days but, thankfully, with a lot of hard work and prayers, Ginger recovered and “back on her feet” and in good health about a year and a half later.

With the children grown and her health good, Ginger began working at a pharmacy where her daughter, studying to be a pharmacist, was completing an internship. After a few years, a better opportunity came along, a special order buyer for Curtis Industries. She enjoyed this job immensely and even joined the company bowling league. Ginger remained at Curtis until her retirement.

With six children, 11 grandchildren, and 10 great-grandchildren (and another on the way), family has always been Ginger’s #1 priority. She enjoys knitting, canning foods, and baking. One of her favorite trips? A cruise with her daughter and son-in-law.

About eight years ago, while dining at the Coffee Cup Café in Bedford, Ginger struck up a



conversation with two women at the next table. They became fast friends and still get together for lunch every week (well, up until a six weeks ago – Coronavirus halted lunch). Their favorite restaurants? Chicago Deli in Solon, and Bob Evans in Bainbridge. When dining at one of these establishments, just tell them “Ginger sent you!” Pretty certain the waitress will share a couple of funny stories.








A SPECIAL DELIVERY OF HOMEMADE MASKS
